Robin Green, Vice-Chair of FIL, has been working hard at the papers of Interlend '89 and those proceedings have been now published (and reviewed in the Library Association Record).

At Edinburgh the FIL Committee gained some new faces: David Kenvyn from Redridge Libraries, Andy Jones from GEC Marconi and Maureen Ridley from Cleveland County Libraries. By now they have all been fully introduced to the workings of FIL and we look forward to their contributions to the Committee. The main discussion at the last two Fil. Committee meetings has been the preparations for Interlend '91. This will be held on 12-13th July 1991 at the University of East Anglia, and speakers

will include, amongst others, David Baker (Librarian at UEA), Graham Cornish (IFLA Office for Interlending) and David Bradbury (Director, BLDSC). This year's conference is entitled 'Surviving success? Politics, promotion and PR'. We felt that as many Interlending sections are so busy and usually overworked it could be said that they are surviving the success of one of the best Interlending networks in the world. The conference will investigate some of the issues raised by this situation, such as charging, acquisitions versus interloans, staffing, copyright, and so on. I hope that you can come and enjoy the third FIL conference

In addition to this the new year will see some more of the popular 'exchange of experience' workshops in the north- and south-west, and also - possibly - one in Scotland (more details of these nearer the time). At the last FIL committee meeting many Interlending problems were discussed, and it seems that our area of interest is a volatile and growing area of the information world. Charging is certainly the key issue of the moment, with many libraries testing the water and getting a range of reactions from both fellow Interlenders and clients. It will be very interesting to hear your views on issues such as this, so do please do send in letters or articles; without it this Newsletter will have very little news!

Finally, look out for Interlend '92 in Bath: never let it be said that that we don't look ahead. A Happy New Year to you all!

INTERLEND '90

A Report on 1992 and all that', FIL's Second Annual Conference

This year's conference was held within the University of Edinburgh's Pollock Halls from the evening of Thursday 28th until Saturday 30th June, 1990, and was attended by over 70 delegates. The theme was the Interlending networks and 1992, and a truly international programme of speakers and topics was successfully presented.

On the first evening Paul Jeorrett (Chair of FIL) welcomed us, and his friendly cheerful manner ensured an informal and lively atmosphere throughout the Conference.


On arrival each delegate was presented with their previously selected preference for attendance at workshops and/or visits.

The first visit on Friday was ED/N-2, the Lending Services Division of the National Library of Scotland, and Miss Wright, the Librarian, welcomed those who had chosen to tour the new building. We were invited to examine the many binders of the unique Scottish Union Catalogue and observe a demonstration on VISCOUNT, the Interlending communications network.

Unfortunately the timing of the walk to visit ED/ U-1, the Main Library of Edinburgh University, coincided with one of the many torrential showers of horizontal rain prevalent during the Conference. However, Mr. Freshwater, Deputy Librarian, warmly welcomed the drenched party and invited them to tour the library with a member of staff.

The workshops, entitled 'The Regions: which way now?', 'International Searches', and 'Copyright and ILL', were stimulating and thought-provoking. I attended Graham Cornish's lively and humorous seminar on the intricacies of copyright, and it was disheartening to see that most of the libraries represented were breaking at least one aspect of the law regarding photocopies.

The international perspective of the conference included lectures on 'The European Outlook' by Niels Mark (from Denmark), 'Open Systems and VISCOUNT' by Peter Smith (of LASER), Australian Medical Library networks by Michelle McAuliffe (from South Australia) and an after-dinner talk with slides by Jacqui Weetman (from Coventry, England) on a six month job exchange with an ILL librarian from the USA. Meanwhile, back in Edinburgh, Scotland, it continued to rain!

REPORT FROM JUGL

Proposed Guidelines for Email ILL

(Robin Green - FIL's representative on the JANET User Group for Libraries - reports on the joint JUGL/FIL proposed guidelines for email ILL requests.)

The following document was prepared in conjunction with the JANET (the Joint Academic Network) User Group for Libraries, with the intention of providing a basis for guidelines or standards for email ILL. It was circulated over JANET via the LIS-ILL mailing list, and over LANET (the Library Association Network on BTGold) in order to attract as much interest as possible from libraries using or considering using email to conduct their Interlending. The guidelines were primarily intended for users of JANET, ie., mostly academic libraries, but there is no reason why they should not be applied to a wider sphere (eg., fax requests).

To my (initial) surprise only a very small number of libraries have offered to participate in the scheme. However, on reflection I think it is due (I hope) to a lack of suitable equipment/facilities and the comparatively small number of requests made library-to-library as much as to an unwillingness on the part of ILL sections to conform to what were seen by JUGL and FIL to be commonsense, easy-to-apply procedures.

There has been a delay to the start of the pilot scheme, mainly because of the small takeup, but the scheme should commence very soon. I will keep FIL members informed, and will be glad to receive any comment or criticism (especially that of the constructive variety!).

The number of libraries making and receiving ILL requests over JANET (and BTGold), both via the BLDSC and directly to/from other libraries, is continually increasing. ILL over JANET gives the potential to provide a faster, cheaper and more responsive service than using other methods.

However, a number of queries about the use of email ILL to make direct requests between libraries have been raised, amongst which are:

- which libraries are able (and willing) to accept email ILL requests?

- are email requests getting through to ILL Departments or disappearing into 'general' library mail?
- how can libraries retain some control/knowledge of the status of their requests?
- libraries have been sending requests out on a general mailing list to all JANET sites. If everyone does this mailboxes will be swamped and no-one will have the time to check them: how can this be avoided?
- what order of priority are email requests expected to be given?

In addition to the possible problem areas that such questions show up, whilst some libraries using JANET for email ILL are happy with the system, others have experienced the following situations after making requests:

- no response is received
- no response is received, but after a period of time a loan results
- after a long period of time a negative reply is received

(the delay in 2 and 3 being anything up to 3 weeks)

There may be other problems which have not come to light as yet.

With such a relatively new and untried system, especially one that will increase in importance as time goes by, it seems sensible to try to ensure that it is used to everyone's best advantage right from the start. With this in mind, the JANET User Group for Libraries (JUGL) met with representatives of the Forum for Interlending (FIL) to discuss how to make email ILL as easy and efficient as possible.

It was felt that this would be best done by suggesting guidelines for libraries to follow when making and receiving requests. For example, guidelines could ensure that a requesting library would receive some sort of response within a certain period of time, and that only one library would actually supply a requested item. >>>

PROPOSED GUIDELINES FOR EMAIL ILL


What is proposed:

- a list is compiled of libraries willing and able to make/receive requests over JANET (the existing listing in the JANET directory is felt to be suspect in that some libraries may have answered 'yes' without a clear understanding of what that entailed):
- the list could include libraries using the JANET PSS gateway in either direction to enable non-JANET libraries to become involved (though mailing list messaging would have to be relayed by the list coordinator);
- -these libraries would observe a set of guidelines (listed below), as a 'pilot scheme' to test what standards for ILL email are desirable and practical. Libraries would not be restricted to only using others on the list, but would not be able to expect the same standards from non-participating libraries;
- the guidelines could be amended as necessary until the libraries involved were happy with them;
- the intention is to involve as many libraries as possible: libraries could be added to the list at any time, the only requirement being that they would be able to observe the guidelines (the scheme is not intended as competition for the BLDSC, but reflects the need to cater for the growing number of requests made directly between libraries):

- the participating libraries would form a user group with a separate mailing list (similar to the existing LIS-ILL, LIS-IT, etc., lists) for administration and discussion of the scheme (the LIS-ILL list would remain as a general discussion list, with matters arising in the closed list being disseminated through it):
- there would be a list coordinator to record problems, suggestions and agreed changes to guidelines. The coordinator would also add libraries to/remove them from the list as necessary:
- the scheme would be self-policing: problems would be aired through the list, and requests could be refused from those not observing the guidelines;
- participating libraries would be asked to record (for the duration of the pilot scheme only):
- the number of requests made directly to other libraries (not the BLDSC) over JANET
- the number of requests received directly from other libraries over JANET

these would be submitted to the list coordinator monthly.

If the pilot scheme is successful, after an initial period (probably 6 months) it will be 'opened' to any library. There would then be no need for a closed group and separate list, which would disappear, leaving the guidelines recognised - and in general use - as a standard for email ILL.



PROPOSED GUIDELINES for the pilot scheme

- The scheme should be used for items which can not be traced by the BLDSC, or are not likely to be held by the BLDSC, or which are in a specialist subject area. The BLDSC should in general remain the first source for ILL requests.
- ILL sections of participating libraries must have their own, or easy and regular access to, a JANET mailbox.
- Mailboxes must be checked once a day; there should be continuity over holiday periods, etc. (other members of the scheme must be informed of times when libraries are not available to deal with requests, eq., over closed periods).
- As far as possible, requests should be prechecked on source library OPACs or union catalogues to determine specific locations.
- Requests should be sent to a single known location and headed 'Please can you lend...?'. For warded requests (requests with a rota of possible locations) are not permitted.
 - 5.2 Broadcast requests (requests sent to all members of the group) should only be used as a last resort, eg., no more than once or twice a year by each library. Such requests should be headed 'Can anyone lend...?'.
- 6.1 Where requests are sent to a specific library the BLDSC form number should be quoted on the request.
 - 6.2 Where broadcast requests are made, the form number should not be quoted on the initial request. Libraries willing to lend should contact the requesting library. The form number is then released to the chosen lender (if potential lenders receive no form number/confirmation of request it should be assumed that the request is being satisfied from another source).

- 7. Requests should contain the following:-
 - bibliographic information of the item requested (including the source library's classmark/call number if known)
 - the signature (JANET address, postal address and 'phone number) of the requesting library
 - the standard request message (see 5 above)
 - any other relevant information
- 8. Responses: one of the following responses must be made within 4 working days of the request being received:-
 - 'your request XXXX is being processed'
 - 'your request XXXX is coming' (the item is then shipped)
 - 'cannot satisfy your request XXXX' (the requesting library is then free to cancel/apply to another source)

and as a positive response to a Broadcast request:

- 'can satisfy your request XXXX'

XXXX must be as a minimum the BLDSC form number, if possible also the bibliographic information of the requested item.

Other discretionary messages can be added as desired, eg., 'incoming requests are processed once a week'.

9. Once a request has been made to a specific library, the same request should not be sent to other libraries unless no response is received by 1 week from the date of the initial request. Should the library the request was originally made to then satisfy the request without confirming that it is still wanted, the requesting library would be under no obligation to provide payment for the loan.

Michelle is pictured here (on the left) with Jacqui Weetman, both of whom spoke on the international Interlending scene at Interlend '90.



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
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
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
